## **Bonnie LaRose & Caper**

Below is the graduation profile of Bonnie LaRose and Caper, who was raised by Brenda Quesenberry of Franklin, VA. Profiles of each graduating class are posted on GEB's website ([www.guidingeyes.org](http://www.guidingeyes.org)).

Bonnie LaRose hails from Watertown, Massachusetts, also the hometown of fellow classmate, Ruth Gurney. Caper is Bonnie's fifth Guiding Eyes dog. As Bonnie describes her, Caper certainly fulfills Webster's definition of her name: "frolicsome, cute as a button, and a little love." When asked about her other GEB dogs, Bonnie said that they each had their own distinct and endearing personality traits that made each a valuable guide and precious companion. Bonnie, now 56 years old, was born with Congenital Glaucoma, and after multiple corneal transplants became blind at the age of 31. She readily admits that it took a bit of time for her to adjust to her blindness, but through the years has "simmered down" and now describes herself as a very social and happy person. She acquired skills as a

medical transcriber at the Massachusetts University Health Services and later worked from her home. While extolling the present GEB Training staff, Bonnie reminisced of the "old days" when, as she explained, "All the training instructors were men!" But she quickly added her approval of the addition of women, explaining emphatically, "I have always felt that GEB is the best school." Bonnie's hobbies and interests have included collecting porcelain dolls, music boxes and a valuable bell collection. She said she feels that she and Caper have bonded already and then whispered: "When we get home, she'll be at my side day and night." Bonnie knows that Caper will enable her to go out on her own and to walk and enjoy the neighborhood; and she'll be great company besides. What more can you ask?

For his part, Sherman is quickly mastering his classroom and hallway manners and gets lots of practice with greetings and sit/stays for distractions.*

#### Dusty

July 6, 1987 - July 31, 2004

**Dusty**, a black male raised by Marcia Keith recently passed away. Dusty was a faithful guide dog for Lil Wyer of Pennsylvania for nine years. Dusty's vet sponsor was WNC Veterinary Hospital of Arden, NC and his food sponsor was the Iam's distributor of Greensboro, NC. Below is a letter to Don & Sherry from Marcia.

Dear Sherry and Don,

This is very difficult to write. I have put this off for two months already but it is time to let you know about Dusty. He had been aging visibly for several months and having more and more trouble getting around. I had bought a harness in the spring so I could assist him in going up and down our three steps and made a ramp to get him and and out of the van. He had arthritis which was getting progressively worse and also had vision and hearing losses but by and large he had no major medical problems. On July 30<sup>th</sup> I received my copy of the summer edition of Puppy Prints. Tansy's obituary was in it. It was just what I needed to make a decision I had put off too long. There was no question that I was being selfish also. I had so hoped Dusty would go peacefully in his sleep one night but that was not to be.

My friend and neighbor, Ruth, volunteers with a veterinary's office and agreed to help me with the final step. We took Dusty the morning of July 31<sup>st</sup>. I couldn't stay with him. It was just too emotional. I am having a hard time

writing this through my tears right now. Dr. Hutsell knew Dusty's history and a note he sent to me afterward said "your decision was best for Dusty, he had a great life and a very long one. He is at peace without pain and should be remembered as a proud and giving individual."

A friend advised me to write a celebration of the seventeen years of his life rather than a lament for my loss. Dusty entered my life as an eight week old puppy in September of 1987. I had learned of the NCPRP from an article in the Asheville Citizen-Times about a puppy being raised locally. I met with the raiser and was put in touch with Sharon Smith and ultimately came to Raleigh to pick up "my" puppy at an evaluation. Dusty had been donated by Duckback Kennels and was adorable, black with brindle markings on his face and paws. His sire was Black and Decker and the kennel wanted to name him Dustbuster because of the dusty look to his paws. I knicknamed him Dusty for ease.

This was my first dog of any type since I had a cocker spaniel as a child. Needless to say it was an eye opening experience. I brought him into a two cat home. A Siamese and a Himalyan. It was a learning experience from the outset. We all adjusted over time and in September of 1988 I took him to the Raleigh airport for IFT. That was probably the second hardest time in my history with Dusty. It was so sad to see his look of bewilderment when I left him and harder still to return home without a dog in the house. He did well and I went to his graduation in December of 1988 and met his new companion Lil Wyer from Upper Darby, PA. He worked for her in and around Philadelphia for nine years including daily trips to the main downtown post office via bus and subway where she worked. I kept in touch with Lil throughout the years and visited with her and Dusty twice in PA. And they came once to the mountains to visit us. It was wonderful to maintain a connection with both of them and led to his returning later.

Dusty retired in April of 1997 due to vision loss which made guiding at night difficult. He came back to NC to live out his retired years. This time into a household with three dogs (two labs) and two cats. But he had another mission to work on. He spent his days at the Oaks, a nursing home down the block from where I worked. It was like a doggy day care. I took him in the morning on my way to work and picked him up on my way home. All the patients, staff and visitors fell in love with him. He retired a second time when I retired and lived out his years in relative peace.
